



Which learning model is your child currently enrolled in? 179 responses




- In-Person Kindergarten Attending the AM Session

Kindergarten: 3-6 Ft. Distancing

Current Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidance recommends 6-ft. social distancing to mitigate COVID-19 transmission. Current Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) guidance recommends a minimum of 3-ft. social distancing to mitigate COVID-19 transmission. In order to bring Kindergarten students back for full days in-person, students would need to be approximately 3-6 ft. apart dependent on the size of our classrooms and the number of students enrolled in each class. When students are unmasked (eating snack/lunch) they would be 6 ft. apart. Would you send your child to school this spring for a full day of in-person learning if we implemented 3-6 ft. social distancing?





Comments from Kindergarten Families that Answered No or Maybe


"Six feet of distance is necessary to keep the students and staff safe. There is no reason to change the schedules again and to increase the risk of the staff without providing them with vaccines."




"My son is doing well in the full remote cohort. I feel that sending school left would disrupt the routine we have and throw him yet another family members who have not yet appointment."

Health & Safety Concern: Kindergarten



Kindergarten: Return in Spring or Fall?




Grades 1-12 Survey Participation



Learning Model: Grades 1-12


Which learning model is your child currently enrolled in? 2,004 responses

- High Needs- Cohort D attending school in-person 3, 4, or 5 days per week






Grades 1-12, Cohorts A, B, and D (In-Person): Health & Safety Concern

Comments: Grades 1-12, Cohorts A, B, and D (In-Person)

"I think for the mental and social well being of my child I truly hope that there is a way to get the kids back to school full time. She is a different kid on the days she is in school vs. the days she is asynchronous or remote. I understand the challenges presented in every situation this year, I just hope that we don't lose sight of what these kids have had to endure for the past year and that being on a screen and independent learning cannot replace the classroom and a teacher."




"Children need to be in school. I'm a physician who has seen plenty of evidence in literature regarding the lack of Covid related risks in children in school." "I'm lucky because my son already has in-person learning for four days. However, Wednesdays are very difficult & learning remotely just him to be in-person on Wednesdays difficult time and the district decision makers are being pulled in many GOOD LUCK!!!:)

Comments from Fully Remote Families

"My major concern with sending my daughter back to school is the plan for lunch/mask breaks and the fact that our state has chosen to not vaccinate the teachers and school staff at this point. I am an Assistant Professor of Immunology and Infectious Disease at Boston University and I have been studying COVID-19 since the start of the pandemic. Sharing air without a mask indoors is the highest risk for transmission. At BU, no one is allowed to have their mask off in the same room as anyone else under any circumstances."



"Full remote cohort C is working wonderfully. It was a hard decision to make at the beginning of the year not knowing if we had teachers from Wilmington to teach the curriculum. I could not be happier. Lots of work, breakout rooms for the kids to team up and talk, and the teachers are attentive. Based on my hybrid friends the Cohort C grade 6 has more work and the fact they have daily instruction is wonderful. My child is happy and prefers to not come back at this time."




With which grade span do you predominantly work? 298 responses

Learning Models


In which learning model do you currently work?

- Combination- I teach both in-person and remotely working with students in multiple cohorts


Expanding In-Person Learning this Spring



When we do return to full in-person learning, which grade span(s) should be prioritized for a return to full in-person learning first?





What suggestions do you have that would make you feel more comfortable with reducing social distancing to a minimum of 3 ft. between students?168 responses



Have you received the COVID vaccine yet? 299 responses




- Yes- 1st dose only

If you answered "No" above, are you planning to get the vaccine as soon as an appointment is available to you?


