- Has WPS given thought to offering a virtual/remote learning option for the 2021-22 school year?

Updates on Health Guidance Around Close Contacts & Our Response

The following update to the quarantine guidance for close contacts was posted by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) and MA Department of Public Health (DPH). This updated guidance went into effect the week of April 20, 2021.

- Close contacts who were exposed to a COVID-19 positive individual in the classroom or on the bus while both individuals were masked do not have to quarantine unless they were within 3 feet of distance of the COVID-19 positive individual for a total of 15 minutes during a 24-hour period.
- This <u>does not</u> apply if someone was identified as a close contact outside of the classroom or bus (e.g. in sports, extra-curriculars, lunch, etc.) or if masks are not worn by both persons at the time of the exposure.
- All other close contacts must follow the standard protocol for when a close contact may return to school.

What this means in practice is that anyone who is within 3 - 6 feet distance of an individual who tested positive in the classroom or on the bus, no longer needs to quarantine. They do however, need to get tested and must send the results to the school nurse. They may attend school and should actively monitor for symptoms.

CDC Guidelines



As a reminder, the CDC defines a close contact as:

- Being within 6 feet of a COVID-19 case (someone who has tested positive) for a total of 15 minutes during a 24-hour period. Multiple brief or transitory interactions (less than a minute) throughout the day are unlikely to result in 15 minutes of cumulative contact and <u>do not meet</u> the definition of close contact. Being in the same room as an individual if you are consistently separated by 6 feet of distance <u>does not</u> meet the definition of a close contact.
- Close contact can occur while being with, caring for, living with, visiting, or sharing a healthcare waiting
 area or room with a COVID-19 case, <u>OR</u>
- Having direct physical contact with the person (e.g. hugging or kissing), OR
- Sharing eating or drinking utensils, OR
- Having direct contact with infectious secretions of a COVID-19 case (e.g., being coughed on) while not wearing recommended personal protective equipment



MCAS and AP Exam Updates 9-12

- Grade 10 ELA testing sessions will be held on May 17 and May 18
- Grade 10 Math sessions and the Grade 9 Science sessions on June 2 and June 3
 - We are not allowed to offer remote testing for grade 10 students. They will have the option of testing this spring or they can test when the retest is offered in the fall.
- AP exams are scheduled from May 18 May 28 and some of that testing involves grade 10 students, so there will be no MCAS testing during that window.
- Juniors will be invited to test with the sophomores if they are interested in the scholarships associated with MCAS scores. They also have the option of either spring or fall testing.

LOOKING AHEAD TO THE SUMMER & BEYOND



Summer Academic Programming

- School districts throughout the Commonwealth are being encouraged to offer some type of summer academic program for students.
- DESE has not established any requirements or expectations around the structure of such programs, including such things as decisions around the age/grade of students targeted the duration of a program or what exactly the focus of any such programs should be.
- It will be the case that summer programming will vary greatly from one school district to another.

Two things to note:

- 1. What we will ultimately be able to offer is entirely contingent upon staff interest as the total number of staff available will determine the total number of sections/grades we can offer.
- 2. WPS will continue to offer the traditional extended year program as required to meet the needs of students as called for on their individual education plan

Summer Academic Programming Continued

- At the present time, entative planning for the summer academic program includes:
 - An option for K-5 students identified by their teachers as potentially at-risk or those who would benefit most from academic support over the summer.
 - Students in grades 6-12 will have an opportunity to pursue remediation and credit recovery.
 - Students will participate in the program for the grade level they just completed.
 - Priority will be given to teacher recommendations and, if additional seats are available, spots will be opened up for other interested students through a lottery system.
 - Anticipated dates of the program will be during the month of July, running Monday through Thursday from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm.
 - These programs will be free of charge for students and supported through the various financial grant opportunities that the District has received.
 - The goal of the program will be to reinforce and practice grade-level skills in ELA and Mathematics with the primary intention of minimizing summer regression.

Class Placement Information For SY 2021-22

- Last year we decided to delay the release of class placement information until the early part of August for a number of reasons:
 - Considerable changes can occur in terms of both staffing and student enrollment over the summer,
 - We find it beneficial to share information about a child's class or teacher placement when it is less likely to change.
- As a result and similar to last year, all student class placement information will be released at the beginning of August

- Re-opened afternoon coverage for Kindergarten (space still available).




Summer:

Summer Wildcat Sports Clinic

The Wilmington High School Athletic Department sponsors a series of sports clinics for children in Grades 1-8. All clinics will be held at the Wilmington High School unless otherwise specified. All clinics will be run by WHS Coaches, Alumni, and Student-Athletes. The cost of most clinics is \$200 per child per clinic. Additional clinic enrollment is discounted.

- All clinics will run 9AM-2PM, Monday through Thursday, and 9AM-12PM on Friday.
- Exception, the first two clinics (Field Hockey and Boys Basketball) will be 4 full days, Tuesday through Friday, due to the Holiday.

The focus of each clinic is the development of skills through activity based drills and scrimmages. The ultimate goal of the clinics is to develop children who enjoy participating in athletics.
